This Week's Feature **Hazel Highlights of the week**

Reflective RE

Hazel Class. Beautiful discussions about God and the creation story and the type of being God must be. Ideas included:

"He showed us how to work hard and keep going but then showed us that we need a rest when we are tired."

"He made us to be fragile but looked after us because when we fall, he puts another layer of skin on us."

"He wanted us to ask, 'Why?' Why does a giraffe have a long neck? Why do zebras have black and white stripes? Why are birds so colourful? Why are ants so tiny? Why are slugs slimy?"

Marvellous Maths

Hazel Class. Our days are full of maths learning, in small group lessons and through play. We are laying some great foundations of number knowledge to set us up for the future weeks of learning. This week, we have been comparing numbers - more, less, equal to?

Reading Heros

Hazel Class. The enthusiasm and effort children are putting into their reading is an inspiration. We are learning at a fast pace and having lots of fun as we go. The pride children are taking in their work is wonderful to see. They are also thinking about sounds throughout the day. For example: d, d, d, door and b, b, b, book. Keep at it guys!

Super Scientists

Hazel Class. Wow...our exploration into different materials continues! This week – magnets and magnetic materials. We carried out an experiment using paper clips, magnets and glass jars full of water. The task was to remove the paper clip without getting our hands wet...the children decided that this felt a little like a fishing rod game! As super-special Scientists, we

made predictions on what might happen and then drew our experiment, thinking about ways we could extend our findings.

Fine Motor Fun

In Hazel Class, we have been racing to use spoons and tweezers to put conkers into bun tins. There is a 30 second timer so that we can race against the clock! We have also been warming our fingers up before we start to write, using different exercises.

In Hazel Class over the past few weeks, Ottis has consistently worked hard. He is trying his best in every area and his beautiful, big smile tells us just how proud he is of his efforts. Helping Your Child to Make a Great Start in School

As schools returned in September teachers have been working hard to understand the next steps needed for each child. I thought it might be useful to share some top tips from the teachers on helping your child to make a great start to the school year.

Top Tips for Nursery

- Please help your child by providing coats and shoes they can attempt to put on themselves, with the changing weather they need waterproofs and warm clothes so that we can take them outside.
- Please count with your child at any opportunity, up steps, counting toys, recognising numbers anywhere and looking at signs, ie; supermarket, road signs, toilet signs etc.
- Please give your child vocabulary, telling them the word for things, animals, weather, sky, colours, positional language i.e. up, down, through, under, over and how to ask for help, will help them enormously.
- Please read to your child and share books and stories with them.
- When they do artwork, ask them to describe their picture as opposed to telling them what you think it is as their imagination may tell them it is something completely different and they use their vocabulary to explain to you which is a good skill.
- Praise and show you value what they do as praise gives them the confidence to do it again.
- We will be focusing on Animals and their babies for a few weeks, please reinforce this by asking them about it at home.
- Please talk to your children about where they live, their relatives and the area around them so that they can tell us in Nursery and we show interest and get to know them.

Miss Holloway's Top Tips for Hazel Class

- Spot numbers everywhere and anywhere! Can you see 5 petals on a flower? How many things can you see 1 of? What numbers are on the clock?
- Play counting games together. Hide and seek is great for counting forwards and timing how many times you can do something (e.g. jumping) is great for counting backwards. What's the time Mr Wolf is another favourite!
- Fine motor activities are great for developing letter formation and neat handwriting. Some ideas are: threading pasta on a string, making a paper chain, playing with play dough, using pegs to help hang out the washing or even colouring in.
- Practice sounds learnt at school. There are sound mats for all in homework books. 5 minutes in the car on the way to school can make a big difference.
- Can you find shapes all around you? What shape are the windows?

Miss Cusack's Top Tips for Oak Class

- Remember to read five times a week - reading helps us to develop our vocabulary and sentence skills.
- Practice your times tables daily. It is important to practice your times tables, I practice mine when I am in the car, hanging up washing or tidying up!
- Practice your number fluency at home.
Can you add and subtract numbers using strategies you have learnt in school? For example: $9 + 8 = 17$, I made ten by adding 1 to my 9 and then added my 8, I need to remember to subtract 1 at the end to compensate for the 1 I added at the start!
- When writing at home, take this as an opportunity to develop your handwriting skills.
- Talk about your learning at home, can you remember key dates we have learnt in history? The names given to different parts of a river in geography or how our internal organs work in science!
- Share your feelings, worries or concerns with an adult - we are here to help!
